Our last parish council meeting was held on the later date of 28 th March and so missed the April newsletter.

A new planning application 28/23/00004 for the installation of a dormer window to the annex roof at Little Whitnell Cottage was unanimously supported.

Application 28/22/00003 for the development of 58 additional touring pitches and the continued use of 53 existing pitches for HPC workers at Mill Farm was granted at a SDC Development Committee meeting held on 7 th March.

At our meeting Wayne Hawley resigned as a parish councillor. Wayne has been a great asset to the council, he was a very supportive and effective councillor. This has created a vacancy. The statutory notice has been put on the notice boards and there were no requests for an election so, we will be able to co-opt a councillor at our meeting to be held on 25 th May.



Denizen of the Dapples

A few butterfly species are able to survive the winter as adults. It is not usually until April that the first new, freshly-emerged butterflies appear, breaking out of chrysalids that have lingered, precariously and utterly dormant, all winter long.

Here in Fiddington, apart from the first of the Small Whites, the likeliest emerger is the Speckled Wood – named a couple of centuries ago as the Wood Argus.

Both names give a good idea of the likeliest places to find this insect, for its favourite haunts are shady lanes, rides in woods and the borders of such – places of dappled sunlight.

The markings of the wings have evolved brilliantly to imitate such conditions. This is a butterfly that avoids bright sunshine.

If the adult butterfly avoids being showy, the caterpillar is even more elusive, being of the same green colouring as the grasses upon which it feeds – for, being one of the so-called "browns" (the Satyridae), this species is dependent upon grasses for larval foodplants.

The female tends to lay her eggs – singly – on plants in more sheltered spots where the ambient temperature is that little bit more sympathetic. There are at least two broods during the course of the year, and even a partial third brood, so that once these butterflies appear on the wing they seem to be around continuously – a business that is further helped by some

of the caterpillars surviving as such throughout the winter,

not pupating until the early spring.

Travels (without my father) Part 2

After our visit to St Simeon we carried on to Aleppo, one of the oldest continually occupied cities in the world – it dates back to the GC BC.

The citadel dominated the city, it was much restored when we were there, but I believe that it was completely destroyed during the civil war of 2012 – 2106. The wonderful souk was also destroyed, but then you could buy anything from diamonds and gold to silks and rose petals (sold by the kilo for rose water) to brown paper bags. I bought a beautiful, very fine, long silk scarf that I often still wear . The archaeological museum was full of treasures, many that I recognised from illustrations in a book that I had as a child called Everyday life in Bible times. Great lions with curly beards and high hats and little plump men wearing skirts seemingly made of feathers.

The next day, after a very early start we went to Ebla, a site dating from the 3rd C BC, little to see, but a glorious hillside situation . The only sounds being larks and a small boy across the valley singing to his goats.

From Ebla it was on to, what at that point, became the highlight of the trip. A small plain where Thutmose 111 of Egypt came to hunt elephants, where Hannibal came to teach the Syrians how to use elephants in war. Here, in the middle of nowhere, was Apamea. A Greco Roman site, with not much left except a road about 2kms long lined with pink barley sugar marble columns topped with white Corinthian capitals. They stand in the middle of fields of waving corn and poppies growing up between the cobblestones. It was hot and quiet and we stood in wonderment.

From there we entered desert country. Not the sand dunes of the Beau Geste movies but flat hard sand with rocks and stones and Bedouin goats who, it would seem, can live on practically anything – plastic bags included. We arrived in the city of Palmyra (home of the legendary queen Zanobia) about 4.30. A perfect time sun-wise. The light and shadows were perfect on the great temple of Ba-al. The following morning it all looked dull and lifeless. The other only thing of note there was a race course! Mostly for camel racing .

The next day we had a long hot bumpy drive across the desert to Bosra. Here, there is a great, wonderfully preserved black basalt stone theatre. Just there in the middle of the town – a 15000 seater, no entrance gates or fees, but mothers sitting on the steps gossiping and doing their knitting whilst their children rode their bicycles and played in the arena.

From here we went on to Jordan – which lacked the charm, peace and lack of tourists which made Syrian so special I have had to leave out so much, this has had to be reduced from 10 pages of notes!

What we did in March: A relaxing time making Easter cards and ornaments.





Moules Mariniers

1.75kg (4lbs) Mussels (scrubbed and beards removed)50g unsalted butter1 medium onion, finely chopped50 mls dry white wine1 tablespoon of coarsely chopped parsley



1.Put the mussels, butter, onion and white wine into a very large pan. Cover and cook over a high heat for 3 - 4 minutes, shaking the pan every now and then, until the mussels have opened.

2 Spoon the mussels into 1 large or 4 smaller bowls, add the parsley * to the remaining juices and pour all but the last remaining juices (which might contain grit or sand) over the mussels. Serve with crusty bread

* If you wish you can add beurre manie ($\frac{1}{2}$ & $\frac{1}{2}$ butter and flour mixed for thickening) and double cream at this point

Our Master of Wine recommends

Almost any flavoursome and fresh white wine will go with this. For the fun of it, I am going to suggest two wines with exotic names.

First from the Marche region of Central Italy, a Verdicchio Dei Castelli Di Jesi. Both Sainsbury's and Morrison's have one on offer £6.75 and £6.50 respectively. The wines have a lively almond and lemon flavour and will go well with this dish. For those who like to make lamp stands out of wine bottles, they come in a pretty skittle shaped bottle.

Second to the Mediterranean Coast in France, a Picpoul de Pinet. The fresh appley white wines are delicious and light. The Wine Society has the Picpoul de Pinet, Domaine Felines Jourdan at £9.75.

Imagine sitting at one of the many fish restaurants at the quaint Port of Sete with a bowl of mussels and a bottle of chilled Picpoul de Pinet. Bliss!
